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Additional instructions for virtual participants:

- For WG and MC participants:
We need to be able to identify participants, therefore we ask you all to use your **real name** when connecting to the teleconference.
- For [MC participants](#) only:
 - We need to be able to rapidly check the quorum in the MC meeting, therefore we ask all the **MC members** to include their **country code** (e.g. PT for Portugal) before their full name, while **MC substitutes** will include the country code + an 'S' (e.g., PT-S for a Portuguese substitute) and **MC observers** will add an 'O' to the country code.  - In case an **MC member** has declined to attend physically, he or she can still participate **online** in the MC meeting, **keeping their voting rights**, no matter whether their substitute is physically in the meeting or not. If, eventually, there are more than two representatives for a country (physically and/or online), the "non voting" representatives can still give their opinion and be heard before casting a consensus vote.

Hotels

Transportation

By plane

The [Athens International Airport](#) has two terminals and serves local and international flights. To get to the city centre, there are various options:

- by Metro/train: Line 3 (Blue Line) (see [map](#)) serves the city centre but check the line that serves better your location. The metro departs from the airport every 36' minutes, and the trip from the Airport to Athens City Center takes around 40 minutes. Tickets cost 9€ (4.5€ for students and elders) and can be purchased either from the station's ticket offices or from the automatic vendors. In a 5-minute walking distance from the terminal, the airport train station building is located at the Departures level and is connected to the main terminal via an elevated passageway.
- by [bus](#): The bus X95 will get you to Syntagma Square in downtown Athens in about 60 minutes, depending on the roads' congestion. Unfortunately, during peak hours, a 45-60 minutes shuttle ride may last more than 90 minutes. You can also check other bus lines depending on where you stay. The bus stop is located at the Arrivals level,

between Exits 4 and 5 and the ticket costs 5.5€ (2.70€ if under 18 or over 65). Tickets are available from the airport ticket offices or on board and must be validated as soon as you enter the bus.

- by taxi: The estimated time from the Airport to the city centre is about 45 minutes (off peak hours) and the fare including all charges between 5 AM till midnight (destination time) is approximately Euro 50,00. From midnight till 5AM the fare including all charges is approximately Euro 65,00 (depending on the traffic). According to the Greek Legislation, taxi drivers should provide upon request a receipt for the amount paid for transportation services and they usually do not accept credit cards. The receipt should also indicate the taxi's registration number and the driver's full name.

By car

You can get into Greece from any of the neighbour countries and get to Athens by car through the national motorways. Driving licences issued in EU and EEA countries are accepted; otherwise, an international driving licence is required.

By train

Although there is an option to use the railway from northern Greece, this is not recommended since the trains are quite slow.
